President Nicastro: Thank you, very much. At this time, does anyone from the public wish to be heard? If you do, just come up and state your name and address for the record.

PUBLIC PORTION

Ms. Morningstar: Hi everyone. Shelly Morningstar, Oakwood Village in Flanders. Good evening. Congratulations on moving ahead with the veterans' opportunity for employment and bidding on programs. That's really important and thank you for moving so quickly on that, all of you.

President Nicastro: Thank you.

Ms. Morningstar: I just wanted to follow up on our meeting from two weeks ago where I know there was discussion about whether or not the Town Council would be adopting a Resolution to declare Mount Olive a Second Amendment Sanctuary. At that meeting, I understood that there would be a follow up this evening on the outcome of your decision and also, I believe that the Township Attorney was going to give some overview of her legal findings since she had not yet had the opportunity to do that. So, I was wondering if we could please have that information.

President Nicastro: Yeah, it will not be coming up for a vote for the Township but the attorney does have information on that . . .

Mrs. Sharpe: Yeah, . . .

President Nicastro: . . . that she can share.

Mrs. Sharpe: . . . I can sum it up very briefly. One, it would not have a force of law because that has to be done by Ordinance, by Municipal Ordinance and that was a Resolution and a Resolution is basically just an opinion or a statement of opinion. So, and I think that was one of your questions, whether it would sort of change the law.

Ms. Morningstar: I wanted to know if there was any liability in passing a Resolution that indicated in its writing that our local law enforcement, police department, and our Township Council would not recognize the laws in the State of New Jersey. That was one of my specific . . .

Mrs. Sharpe: Right.

Ms. Morningstar: . . . questions.

Mrs. Sharpe: Since it doesn't have the effect of law; no. It should not be construed as endorsing or directing the police department or anyone else to ignore their constitutional obligations and the obligations that they took under their oaths of office.

Ms. Morningstar: Thank you, very much, . . .

Mrs. Sharpe: You're welcome.

Ms. Morningstar: . . . for the summary. I appreciate it. In closing, I want to thank you all for listening to the community, for understanding that we have a Constitution that respects all of the Bill of Rights and Amendments and for most importantly not feeding in to opinions one way or the other, that could potentially cause distress to the people who live here, confusion about the role of the police, and most importantly, continues to keep Mount Olive a place where people want to live, raise a family, open up a business, and I applaud you all for giving this great consideration and thank you, very much.

President Nicastro: Thank you. Mr. Roman.

Mr. Roman: Shelly, if I may interject. I have to take a note and I disagree with your term of the word sanctuary. Nothing in the Resolution that I had proposed last meeting included the word sanctuary at all and nothing in the body of the Resolution would ever be construed by anybody, reasonable or otherwise, that they would not be required to follow any of the laws in the State of New Jersey or the Federal Government, so, . . .

Ms. Morningstar: Is this for the public comment? Or . . .

Mr. Roman: This is me responding.

Ms. Morningstar: . . . are you representing the Council in your response?

Mr. Roman: No, I'm . . .

Ms. Morningstar: Because I had my questions answered, Alex, and thanked you all for giving it great consideration.

Mr. Roman: . . . and since this is . . . and since this is a Council meeting, I am full within my rights to be able to answer or pontificate as to anything that you have commented.

Ms. Morningstar: Okay.

Mr. Roman: I'm speaking out for myself. I have not abandoned bringing this Resolution back up at a future date, so, I don't consider it closed by any means and I will continue to work with my fellow Council members and the public to bring this, which I feel, an important Resolution back up to the floor. Thank you.

Ms. Morningstar: Well, I appreciate your comments and I'll be back for every meeting that we're going to have this discussion on, and again, I thank you all for giving great consideration. I'm a little confused, though, because Council President and the attorney said that there would be no vote on any Resolution and now we are discussing that that's not off the table, according to you, Councilman Roman, and that is a potential Resolution and the Township residents and constituents deserve to have clarity from this entire elected public board.

President Nicastro: Mayor.

Mayor Greenbaum: Well, Shelly, let me answer it this way, and you know what my position was on . . .

Ms. Morningstar: I do.

Mayor Greenbaum: . . . on the particular Resolution. I don't know that there's anything that anybody can do to stop Councilman Roman from reintroducing the Resolution. He's got a right to do that. I think that Council President Nicastro certainly indicated what the feeling was of the majority of the Board, that they're not in favor of moving forward with the Resolution on behalf of the Township. My opposition really to the entire Resolution was more broad than just the Second Amendment issue that was put on the table. We have worked very hard as a group, as a government, to bring the community together. Not to separate the community. There are many divisive issues, many different types of Resolutions that we could discuss and put on the table for adoption whether it's, you know, Second Amendment, whether it's sanctuary cities for illegal immigrants, whether it's birth control or any of those issues which there are very . . . there are very important issues to be addressed but not by this governing body as a whole. So, my position was no matter how you feel about it individually, about any of these issues, it's not appropriate for us as a municipality to adopt a position which is so divisive . . .

Ms. Morningstar: Mhm.

Mayor Greenbaum: . . . that it doesn't represent 99 percent of the community. Adopting a Resolution with respect to alopecia, adopting a Resolution with respect to Autism Week. Those are all things that we . . .

Ms. Morningstar: Women's suffrage . . .

Mayor Greenbaum: . . . women's suffrage.

Ms. Morningstar: . . . anniversary.

Mayor Greenbaum: Yes . . .

Ms. Morningstar: Thank you so much for lighting up the Township, by the way.

Mayor Greenbaum: . . . and so, my point is that as a governing body, and I caution all of you as we move forward, that your own personal opinions, you're free, and I'm sure even Shelly will tell you, you're free to move forward, to say whatever you want, . . .

Ms. Morningstar: The First Amendment covers that.

Mayor Greenbaum: . . . that's right. Take whatever position you want but as a body, I think we all have to be very cognizant of no matter which side of the issue you're on, that there are divisive issues that we as a governing body should not be taking a position on behalf of the municipality because you don't represent . . . all you're doing is creating a divisive issue. It's best left for individual people to argue. It's not something that we have any control over anyway and the positions that we take are counterproductive to our entire effort of building a sense of community. So, let's move forward together. You can take whatever positions you want but I urge the Council as these issues come up, and they probably will again in some form on some issue, that you need to be very careful about taking a position on behalf of the entire community because it's not, in my opinion, it's not right.

Ms. Morningstar: Thank you for your . . .

President Nicastro: Thank you.

Ms. Morningstar: . . . comments, Rob, and remarks. Also, I again want to thank the Township attorney for your summarizing and responding because I think those were the questions that . . . I asked one and somebody else asked another and it set forth clear. So, as I understand that I'm hearing correctly, that right now, the Mount Olive Township Council is not going to put forth the Second Amendment Sanctuary non-binding Resolution as a Resolution at this point.

President Nicastro: Correct.

Ms. Morningstar: That could change.

Mayor Greenbaum: I think actually . . .

Ms. Morningstar: Okay.

Mayor Greenbaum: . . . what you're hearing right now is that there is not a majority of Council people . . .

Ms. Morningstar: Okay.

Mayor Greenbaum: . . . who are in favor of moving forward with such a Resolution.

Ms. Morningstar: Thank you. Thank you. I appreciate it.

President Nicastro: You're welcome.

Mrs. Labow: Shelly, . . .

President Nicastro: Mrs. Labow.

Mrs. Labow: . . . I just want to say I agree with what the Mayor has said and while I do appreciate it, that Alex likes to bring different subjects forward, I absolutely will not be voting in favor of that and I just really do not like to have our entire community so upset and concerned over something like Rob said, we have no control. We have no control over that. It's . . . I'd rather spend my time on things that we can actually do something about.

Ms. Morningstar: Thank you for your comments and your commitment . . .

President Nicastro: You can't say from there anyway.

Mrs. Labow: Yeah.

President Nicastro: You'd have to stay there. Thank you. Yes, please state your name and address for the record.

Mr. Martinelli: Good evening, Town Council. My name is Ray Martinelli. I am with the New Jersey State Veterans Chamber of Commerce. I'm the Vice President for Skills and Development. I'm also a Town resident. I would like to thank you for adopting the Resolution today and would like to, on behalf of the State Veterans Chamber of Commerce, provide an award for becoming a veteran-friendly municipality. The award reads "Mount Olive Township is hereby recognized as a veteran-friendly municipality in the State of New Jersey for their commitment to veterans by assigning veteran business procurement goals, establishing a veterans hiring program, and providing specialized veteran-only parking throughout the municipality. This municipality strives to make the lives of veterans better and is therefore awarded the official veteran-friendly municipality designation for 2020."

Mrs. Labow: Yay.

President Nicastro: Thank you.

Mrs. Labow: Nice. No photo bombing?

President Nicastro: Oh, I forgot where I am. Council Comments. Mr. Amianda.

COUNCIL COMMENTS

Mr. Amianda: None.

President Nicastro: Mr. Ferrante . . . oh, I’m sorry. Does anyone else from the public wish to be heard? I apologize. Seeing none. We’re closed to the public. Now, Mr. Ferrante, anything?

Mr. Ferrante: Nothing.

President Nicastro: Mrs. Labow.

Mrs. Labow: Nothing.

President Nicastro: Mr. Stewart.

Mr. Stewart: Yeah, just a reminder on March 6, 2020 and March 7, 2020 is our annual radio auction in support of the Hackettstown Medical Center. A few of the folks here on Council were kind enough to also help support that by providing some gift certificates and the bidding is actually available online now. Big fundraiser for the hospital.

President Nicastro: Thank you. Mr. Roman.

Mr. Roman: First, I’d like to thank the rest of my Council members for considering the Resolution that I brought forth the last meeting and also would like to apologize on all the vitriol that you received. Not to disagree with the Mayor; I do think it’s important that this governing body, every once in a while, touch in on issues that are . . . that the State ends up imposing on Townships and protect the rights of a minority, in this case it would be a gun owning minority, and I will defend any group that I seem to . . . that I deem to being attacked or whenever I believe that a constitutional amendment is being attacked, whether that be the first amendment, the fourth, or the nineteenth. I will not stop, you know, I definitely will not be bringing this Resolution back up to see it fail as it does not serve the purpose but at least what it did, is it brought light to the issue of the State constantly imposing new regulations that do not actually affect the safety of the residents of the State and the Township and to continue that have it be labeled sanctuary when nothing in the Resolution indicates anything of the sort or would at any point justify any resident to break a law, whether State or Federal is . . . serves a dispurpose to the discussion of issues and I’d like to once again, thank the rest of my Councilmembers for, you know, broaching this issue. Thank you.

Mrs. Labow: Thank you.

President Nicastro: You’re welcome. Thank you. Do we have a motion to adjourn?
